

Parables of Jesus—Service Faith and Duty

How Is Your Attitude?

Our 'attitude' represents what we believe about a person, place, thing or event. Attitudes are judgments. In this passage Jesus teaches about four attitudes within the believing community, the Church.

Introduction: This passage contains four parts: <u>a warning</u>, <u>instruction</u>, <u>exhortation</u> and a <u>parable about service</u>. Each concerns some aspect of our attitudes as disciples, a topic Jesus highlights as he draws closer to Jerusalem.

A. The Warning–Offending Others 17:1-3a

- 1. It is impossible to NOT offend other people.
- 2. However, the word 'offenses' [skandalon] is more than a scandal; this refers to enticement to sin leading to apostasy.
- 3. The little ones are God's special objects of His care—you and I.

B. The Instruction-Forgiving Others 17:3b-4

- 1. Equally important (to not offending others) is to forgive others.
- 2. Sin is to be rebuked—but the sinner's repentance should produce the church's forgiveness.
- 3. Accountability for keeping relationships working comes from those involved in the events.
- 4. 'Seven times a day,' is figurative for as many times as a person repents—we should forgive them.

C. The Exhortation—Speaking Faith 17:5-6

- 1. Here the apostles had a hard time grasping the concept of 'forgiveness' and ask that Jesus would increase their faith.
- 2. In Mark 9 a father asks Jesus to increase his faith for healing and in Matt 17 rebukes the disciples unbelief and uses the mustard seed illustration.
- 3. It takes faith to believe in healing and faith to believe in forgiveness.
- 4. The key here is NOT the quantity of faith—but the presence of faith. Great faith was not required—simple mustard seed faith.
- 5. "Say to the mulberry tree,' continues the figure of the mustard seed to mean we can 'speak' in faith—forgiveness.

D. The Parable–Serving God *17:7-10*

- 1. Does this parable seem harsh to you?
- 2. The key here is that 'obedience' is NOT a matter of merit (though God does honor it), but of duty.
- 3. We do not have the right to pick and choose what to obey.
- 4. <u>Our Attitude</u>: A servant [doulos] serves with no strings attached and without a 'reward' expectation.
- 5. <u>God's Attitude</u>: *Luke 12:37* Blessed *are* those servants whom the master, <u>when he comes</u>, <u>will find watching</u>. Assuredly, I say to you that <u>he will gird himself and have them sit down *to eat*, and will come and serve them.</u>

Through **FAITH** God gives us the capacity [grace] to NOT offend others, to forgive others, and to serve God.

Luke 17:1-10

:1 Then He said to the disciples, "It is impossible that no offenses should come, but woe *to him* through whom they do come!

:2 It would be better for him if a millstone were hung around his neck, and he were thrown into the sea, than that he should <u>offend one of these little ones</u>.

:3 <u>Take heed to yourselves</u>.

If your brother sins against you, rebuke him; and if he repents, <u>forgive him</u>.

:4 And if he sins against you seven times in a day, and seven times in a day returns to you, saying, 'I repent,' <u>you shall</u> forgive him."

:5 And the apostles said to the Lord, "<u>Increase our faith</u>."

:6 So the Lord said, "If you have faith as a mustard seed, you can say to this mulberry tree, 'Be pulled up by the roots and be planted in the sea,' and it would obey you.

:7 And which of you, having a servant plowing or tending sheep, will say to him when he has come in from the field, 'Come at once and sit down to eat'?

:8 But will he not rather say to him, 'Prepare something for my supper, and gird yourself and serve me till I have eaten and drunk, and afterward you will eat and drink'?

:9 Does he thank that servant because he did the things that were commanded him? I think not.

:10 So likewise you, <u>when</u> you have done all those things which you are commanded, say, 'We are unprofitable *[unworthy]* servants. <u>We have</u> done what was our duty to do.' "
